
Making Your Own French Spinners

Follow the six basic steps shown below and you will guickly become a spinner making expert.



Using a Pair of Needle or Round Nose Pliers

When making spinners using this method use a purchased "open loop" wire shaft with one end straight and the other end with an open loop as shown or make your own using a wire former.




